At 16.9 million acres, the Tongass National Forest in southeast Alaska is the largest in the United States, roughly the size of West Virginia. While tourism and fishing are the foundation of the region's economy, money-losing timber sales and costly logging roads too often take priority in the Tongass, at an average cost to taxpayers of \$30 million per year. The sales return a few pennies on each dollar expended. The U.S. Forest Service is proposing to repeal the 2001 Roadless Rule in the Tongass, which could greatly expand heavily subsidized timber sales and lock in taxpayer losses for many years to come, with huge missed opportunities for local fisheries and tourism.
