Chairwoman DeLauro, Ranking Member Granger, Chairman Leahy, Vice Chairman Shelby,

As representatives of a broad coalition of conservation and forestry organizations and municipal agencies, we are writing to express our strong support for the U.S. Forest Service's Community Forest and Open Space Conservation Program (CFP). Since its establishment in 2012, CFP has supported 66 community forest projects across 23 states and territories. Additionally, these investments in conservation have been used to leverage more than twice the federal funds. Building on this track record of success, the demand for CFP funding has grown significantly

and currently far exceeds the available appropriation. For these reasons, we strongly urge you to build upon the CFP's history of achievement by increasing the program's appropriation from \$4 million to \$8 million in the Fiscal Year 2022 Interior and EPA Appropriations bill.

CFP is an innovative tool to advance the Administration's goals of supporting local economies, increasing opportunities for Americans to connect with forests in their own communities and fostering new public-private partnerships. We believe that these connections are vital to communities' livability and economic well-being. Since Fiscal Year 2012, CFP has contributed to this important effort by assisting local communities to secure forests for public recreation, sustainable forestry, and wildlife habitat and water quality preservation.

As you know, CFP provides matching funds to help local government entities, Indian tribes, and community based non-profit organizations purchase forestlands threatened with development for local ownership and management as community forests. The program directly addresses the urgent need to prevent the widespread conversion of private forests to non-forest uses. This threat was highlighted in the U.S. Forest Service report *Private Forests, Public Benefits*, which projected that 57 million acres of America's private forests could experience a substantial increase in housing density by 2030.

In its brief history, CFP has made substantial progress in preserving forests by combining federal and non-federal resources. Indeed, project partners leveraged \$11.4 million in federal funds to secure \$25.1 million in non-federal funding. As a result of these partnerships, more than 16,000 acres of private forestlands have been acquired by local communities, to create new or expand existing community forests. This impressive leveraging ratio demonstrates the willingness of local entities to match federal funding with significant commitments of funding and other resources.

Given the strong interest in the Community Forest Program and its impressive leveraging successes, we urge you to sustain the program's growing momentum by providing greater funding to meet demand. An \$8 million investment in the program as part of the FY 2022 Interior and EPA Appropriations bill will allow the program to benefit even more communities across the nation.
