

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH TOOLKIT

Addressing the Effects of Climate Change on Women Around the World

This Women's History Month is a time for Women and Climate activists around the country to join in the important, overlapping fight for climate justice.

With this year's unprecedented climate disasters like hurricanes in Puerto Rico, Texas and Florida as well as wildfires in the American west, women were hit especially hard. In caring for their families, surviving without adequate resources nor government assistance and even being forced out of their homes, it's clear women and their families faced some of the most treacherous effects of our changing climate. Yet, time and time again, women lack a platform for their voice and policy input when it comes to this global crisis.

But now environmental and women's rights advocates can join to rally around a policy that can help address climate impacts that often and disproportionately fall on women. On Feb. 6, Rep. Barbara Lee of California introduced the <u>2018 Women and Climate Act</u> with the goal of further researching and easing the burden women take on in the wake of a shifting climate.

This toolkit exists for partners and supporters to initiate a drumbeat on this important issue and promote Lee's legislation that works to address the problem. Over the 2018 Women's History Month, several events will offer a chance to change the conversation in addressing climate change into one that highlights the communities and populations most impacted.
